## THE CONDITIONS

Statistics about the living conditions of farm workers may be quite well-known by now, but as a reminder here is once again a sampling:

### Wages

- Average annual earnings in 1968: \$1,307.
- Average hourly wages in 1969: \$1.43.

### Health

- Life expectancy for farm workers is 49 years.
- In 1969 infant and maternal mortality was 125 percent higher than the national rate.
- A California Health Department survey in 1969 revealed at least 150 cases per 1,000 workers of pesticide poisoning.
- Child labor is very common. In California alone 1/4 of the farm workers are children under 16.
- Farm labor is rated the third most dangerous occupation by the Senate Subcommittee on Migratory Labor.

# Boycott Lettuce.

We are convinced that until all the poor are organized into strong unions, responsive to their members, that our American ideal of equality will be only an empty dream.

For years the farm worker has been abandoned to his own fate - without representation, without power - subject to the mercy and caprice of the rancher. Our wages and working conditions have been determined from above. Our sweat and blood have fallen on the land to make other men rich. We are suffering.

The most obvious effects of this unjust system are:

starvation wages  
contractors, day hauls  
forced migration  
sickness  
subhuman living conditions

We seek our basic God-given rights as human beings. We ask for, and have, the support of the Church in what we do.

We are poor, we are humble. We do not want the paternalism of the ranchers; we do not want the labor contractor; we do not want charity at the price of our dignity. We want to be equal with all the working men in the nation; we want a just wage, better working conditions, and a decent future for our children. To those who oppose us, be they ranchers, contractors, police, politicians, or investors, we say that we are going to continue this struggle until we die, or we win.

We shall overcome!

The time has come for the liberation of the poor farm worker.


