FARMWORKERS NEED YOUR HELP

They are struggling for their rights and an end to exploitation. Presently they have no sanitation on the job, no washing facilities, no safety equipment, no job security, no greivance procedure, no medical plan, and no protection from the misuse of pesticides and chemicals. They have to endure abusive supervisors, racial discrimination, sexual exploitation, child labor, labor camp-barrack housing, poverty level wages and countless other injustices. These result in extremely high job injury rates, disease rates, infant mortality rates, and school drop-out rates The cause is the greedy growers and their enormous, arbitrary powers.





For many decades farmworkers have been struggling to end their exploitation and oppression. The growers have always been able to use their enormous power to beat down these organizing attempts. Out of a farm strike in Delano California in 1965, Cesar Chavez has developed a national movement to finally bring justice to field laborers. In its struggle to organize the poor migrants, the United Farm Workers has tackled entire multi-billion dollar industries composed of powerful and wealthy growers, corporations and conglomerates. They have resisted massive assaults by the corrupt, racketeering Teamsters and the right-wing Nixon and Ford administrations.

The UFW has survived and continued to organize and boycott. It has just won an immense breakthrough-a law in California which will force that state's growers to hold union recognition elections. This is a milestone event, the first of its kind for farmworkers in America, and the most significant legislation for them since the abolition of slavery. Under it the farm workers are pushing to win elections for 250,000 workers this fall.



Even so, it is only a beginning; it only guarantees union elections, not contracts. Elections can't end child labor, pesticide abuses, etc. Only good union contracts can do that. The growers will sign contracts only if the boycott is strong enough once the elections are over. If it isn't they will continue to refuse to deal with the needs of the workers. The UFW must continue to boycott until contracts are signed.
