The Department of Agriculpeople work on the nation's farms during a year. Only 500,-000 of these can be considered professionals who earn all or most of their livelihood from such work. Currently no law gives these workers, outside of California, the right to organize and bargain collectively with their employers.

The California union elections will involve 40,000 to 50,000 workers of the total farm labor force of 280,000.

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
