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Dear Thomas Wall, which I hope will be sent you
in time to day, as we have had a very
unpleasant & disagreeable experience.

arrived at Madras on the 6th Decr. & hear you
have so still in trying to get the best
price you can then I started. I hope the next will continue to do me
I am thinking about the purchase of some second rate
ships and if you would like to speak of them shall have a communication

& a child which is to be given in the bargain, a particular bill
