I have don't know how to do you by with a great deal of pleasure to hear you are well, but am concerned to hear my poor Jiles breaking out returning so bad would have you get some good advice about it and not let it run too far.

Length out this on a general occasion you demand rather you could have agreed with him for forfeiting all his passage there, you could have got substitutions however he has settled it down provided he would have allowed in the brace, as Mr Petrie is obliged to pay payment in goods, wish you could give the person who does it is that is to buy his goods this and to offer him in payment £1000 Cash or otherwise at the Cape as I came up a Thursday who said he was to call off, Saville Lancer, & would bring round our debts.

I left an order, I think, with Dr. Gray an Indemnity for every damage or waters etc etc which Indemnity he promised to pay whose he has not neglected.

Mr Storke at New Haven has wrote to me for to get him about 6000 feet of Choice Mahogany, wish you could agree with Harvey for some as I know he was cutting some very good, as any other person, that could get only again the ship of Captain Stevenson arrived, or that of Blatchfison. If with you want to put Lawrence at Bay to have me a few hours along I don't differ with them about the price as I want willingly oblige and man of whom I may have occasion to ask some favours in return as I know it and we in the power to let me in the affair after Blackfissons in case of hindrance go to law, as I have

further fears to believe my wife good, and falling Campbell
in a manner confess'd to me, that he must depend on me
at last to strengthen his title. Had a message from Mr.
Anthony Brett the attorney, that he had fully considered &
stated the case & that it was all the Committee's opinion
who had seen it that I had an absolute title.

At Mrs. Peeler Lndr. a letter by the bearer to Mr. James Campbell
which he says you will forward to him, if he sends an answer
to return it by some opportunity.

Found every thing here in pretty good order tho' we sell
short of our crop of Cotton, having made above 7 or 8 bags of
about 200 lbs apiece

Planning to set out for Town tomorrow morning, & hope
to write you soon from thence, for now conclude with
best wishes
