1762, August 4: Stephen Fuller [merchant] to Thomas Hall



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London 4th August 1762.

Dear Sir,

We received your favours of the 25 April
and the 11th of May. We have done all your Insurance,
what we did in May, was done at 12 Guineas;
what we have done since, has been done at 8 Guineas,
warranted with Convoy, valuing your sugars at
10/- per Cask. - We have added £100 to your Insurance
on the Boys. We are very glad to hear that you
are free from your Alarms of the Encour. We
are in daily expectation of News from the Haven:
nah, and cannot help being anxious about the
Event, as we are well apprized of the danger
our Army may possibly be in there from the
Inclination of the Season. We have given
the French another little hinting in Germany,
and we believe should be too much for them
there, if the Revolution in Prussia had not hap-
pen'd: What will be the Consequence of that
Event one can hardly foretell, but may prophecy
that The new Empress will break with Prussia
and join the French again, and the house of
Austria - Mrs Hall holds it pretty well
and is better than we expected. The Girls & Boys

are all well except Billy, who has brought a little Fever & Head-ach with him from Eton; but I fancy it is only a slight obstruction of Perspiration, as we have another boy from thence that has the very same complaint. Mr. Hall continues at her little-little-House at Hammersmith, and comes to Town twice a week to forward Molly, who improves surprisingly every hour. We are sorry that we are not to expect you till the Spring, but we had much rather you stay in Jamaica a week-month longer, than to you under the necessity of taking another Voyage a year or two hence. We hope this will find you safe & well. We are dear Sir,
