Dear Sir

The Young Gentlemen having inform'd me of their intention of going to London tomorrow I shall trouble them to deliver these few lines to you, instead of making my personal appearance with them in Dean-Street, hoping you will excuse my attendance on them till about the middle or latter end of next week, as I can't so conveniently leave College before that time, but will notwithstanding come immediately upon receipt of a line from you, if it is more agreeable to you. Whenever I come I believe it will be on Horse-back, as I am about purchasing one.

I can still continue to congratulate you on the good behaviour of the three Young Gentlemen, which I do assure you hath been such as highly to deserve commendation & praise, neither have I the least doubt of its continuance: for I am satisfied, that when any one hath once experienced the delights of leading a sober & regular life & hath been associat'd with rational Company (for I can scarce think those deserve the Epithet, who only meet to be noisy & drunken) he will not easily be drawn aside afterwards: nor indeed will he be so closely press'd by idle Companions, who finding him not for their turn will be as desirous to get rid of him, as he of them.
