WASHINGTON, April George Meany, president of the A.F.L.-C.I.O., accused the Team-

sters today of a "vicious" and "disgraceful" campaign to wipe out the United Farm Workers Union and pledged an all-out battle by his federation to help "this small, struggling union." Mr. Meany said in a statement that he had instructed the federation's director of organization, William Kircher, to provide all possible assistance to

Mr. Meany noted today that Mr. Chavez had asked for a full-scale Congressional investigation of "this cynical deal." ""The A.F.L.-C.I.O. fully supports this request and urges the appropriate committees of the Congress to conduct prompt and public investigations." Mr. Meany also said that he

would bring the issue up before the federation's next executive council meeting early in May to discuss additional action to help the farm workers in their

struggle.

An A.F.L.-C.I.O. spokesman said one possibility was nationwide support for the boycott of lettuce and a renewed boycott of table grapes being conducted by the farm workers. **Contracts Expiring** A grape boycott forced the grape growers in California to

sign contracts with the United Farm Workers three years ago.

Now these contracts are expiring and the growers are signing new labor contracts with the International Brotherhood

of Teamsters. Officials of the farm union concede that their organization could be destroyed if they lost California's 60,000 grape workers to the teamsters. In his statement, Mr. Meany said that the teamsters were engaged in "a concerted campaign to wipe out the United Farm Workers."

"The teamsters' union-bust-

ing drive would be absolutely disgraceful under any circumstances," Mr. Meany said. "But for the nation's largest union to seek to destroy this small struggling union, representing some of the most exploited workers in the nation, is intol-

erable." The most "reprehensible" part of the teamsters' "sweetheart" contract with the grape growers, Mr. Meany said, is its "revival of the most vicious employer hiring practice - the use of labor contractors."
