# To All Members: Greetings:

The First Organizing Convocation in Texas of the United Farm Workers of America, AFL-CIO will convene in the gynmasium of the Pharr-San Juan Alamo High School, located between San Juan and Pharr, on Sunday, February 25, 1979, at 7:00 a.m., and remain in session until business is concluded on that same afternoon.

We come together as one union, as one people united in struggle against the common enemies of the poor and oppressed everywhere: exploitation, poverty and powerless ness.

We plant, cultivate and harvest the greatest abundance of food that the world has ever known, enough food to feed America and much of the world.

We are the instruments of this great production. The wealth of-agri-business is built with our blood and sweat. We suffer to make other men rich but our sacrifices go unrewarded. The story of our plight is a tale of injustice, de gradation and human misery.

We are the victims of a labor system that treats workers like agricultural implements and not as human beings. The trucks and buses we are transported in are old and unsafe. The fields are carelessly sprayed with poisons. The laws that doexist are not enforced. The growers and labor contractors have too little regard for the value of our lives.

One union for farm workers affirms our importance as human beings. We are important because of the work we do. We are not implements to be used and discarded. We are human beings who sweat and sacrifice to bring food to the tables of mill ions of people throughout the world.

One union will unite all farm work ers in America regardless of race, creed, sex or nationality.

One union will bring the blessings of democracy and collective bargain ing to farm workers in all parts of the nation.

One Union will liberate farm work ers from the deprivation and discrimination that impoverishes so many people in this rich land.

One union will create a mighty force for dignity and justice for all poor people in America and a round the world.

### Representation

Each member of each Organizing Committee shall be entitled to elect three delegates for every four members in the respective Organizing Committee.

Secretary,

Only members in good standing with the Union may participate in del egate elections.

No person shall be recognized as a delegate who is not a member in good standing of the Organizing Committee he or she is elected to represent.

The number of delegates from each Organizing Committee will be determined by the number of members in the committee who have signed membership cards before the Convocation was called and are members in good standing.

Delegates to the Convocation shall be elected by secret ballot by mem



color wales bers of the Organizing Committee no later than the Second Sunday of Feb ruary. Each Committee elects one alternate for every three elected delegates, who should attend the convocation in case the delegate is absent.

The names of the delegates shall be certified by the President of the Union immediately after their selec tion to be received no later than February 18, 1979.

Credential blanks are forwarded to all Organizing Committees. Creden tials must be attested as required on the blanks by the President and the Secretary. An authorized list of the credentials should be sent to the Administrative Offices of the Union in San Juan as soon as the delegates are elected. One creden tial remains with the elected dele gate and alternate which will be presented to the Credentials Com mittee on the day of the Convoca tion.

The Credentials Committee shall meet at the Convocation Center prior to the opening of the Convoca tion. The Convocation shall not be constituted for business until after the Credentials Committee shall have examined and reported on the credentials of all delegates present at the scheduled time on the date of the opening of the Con niles by the meder the camelton who have expect non
